

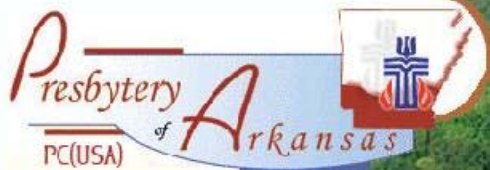

Hope for Real

Double clicking my way through the computer-matched list of possible candidates for our several pastor-seeking churches, my "inbox" binged. The message: an invitation from our friend, Karen, to join CarePage, a way to stay in touch with those facing medical treatment. It was personal. She said, "It'll take some of the pressure off not having to make phone calls and do personal emails, but I'll likely need some support."



Karen was diagnosed with breast cancer over five years ago. She underwent arduous treatment then and, we thought, "Well, that's that!" We shared her hope that her five-year non-recurrence window meant she was in the clear. It would stay open. Sadly, it did not. At five years and one month, a new biopsy has indicated another form of cancer seemingly unrelated to the first. So, Karen and her husband, Jack, are awaiting word on a treatment plan for the next round of their battle.

Word came on this first Sunday of Advent. Word came when many churches focused attention on being awake, wide-eyed for the One coming, when the word reminded us that we don't know when God's chosen One will show up. Word came from Karen on the Sunday when we had heard scripture encourage us to stay on the alert because we have reason for hope. Karen's invitation brings both being ready and hopeful into sharp focus, much the same way the Advent scripture does. No one knows the hour when some terribly personal shock will come. Yet, hope keeps us breathing when our hearts jump into our throats.

It would be hollow to try to cheer Karen up. She's too matter of fact. Works for NASA as a rocket scientist, deals with data, depends on accuracy. But, now, a caveat. There's nothing wrong with being optimistic. I'm in favor of being positive. So don't hear this as dishing a cheerful spirit. Optimistic cheeriness, however, is far from hope. Plus, it's usually spouted by those who haven't had biopsies that mean more surgery, more chemo, more radiation. Optimism is that shallow pool that evaporates when the heat's on and nothing much goes our way. In real life, like Karen's, medical check-ups don't always go the way we want. But that's when hope trumps mere optimism. Hope stares cancer in the face, recognizes its malevolence and believes, in spite of its nastiness, that not even cancer can strip away hope in the One who climbed on the bars of death to declare our last enemy forever dethroned.

As we move further into Advent, will you welcome hope? Hope with me that Karen will know she cannot be separated from God's love? Will you also remember that the hope for Karen is for you and me as well because none of us knows the hour either? What we can claim for sure is that while optimism may fizzle, hope endures. It is not ours to create, only ours to receive, an Advent gift we need and are freely offered even here, even now.

## Longtime Little Rock Pastor Dies

Richard Bladworth Hardie Jr., pastor emeritus at Westover Hills Presbyterian, Little Rock, died November 29 in Little Rock at the age of 89. "Preacher Dick," as he was called by three generations of parishioners, was born in Dallas and served in the U.S. Navy during World War II. After graduating from Austin College, he attended Union Seminary in Richmond, Virginia. Hardie was the first minister of Westover Hills Presbyterian and served as pastor for 36 years. He was a prominent civil rights leader in integrating Little Rock schools. In 1985, Preacher Dick retired and completed a term as moderator of the Presbytery of Arkansas.

In retirement Hardie served as director of church relations for Austin College and then as interim pastor at First, Little Rock; Park Hill Presbyterian, North Little Rock; St. Andrews Presbyterian, Little Rock and other churches.

Dr. Hardie is survived by his wife of 27 years, Carolyn; his children, Richard B. Hardie III and Celeste White; Kathleen Hardie and Joseph Stenger, their children Bret and Patrick and his wife Becky and daughter Arabel; Elizabeth and Ted James, their children Will and Katherine. He is also survived by Ellen McEwen, her children Josh Minter, Jesse Minter and wife Rachelle; Debbie Cooper; Melissa and Tim Stillings and children Haley and Gregory; Matthew and Mandy McEwen, their children Peyton and Sydney; and his sister, Mary Frances Martin and her husband Bill.

A memorial service will be held at Westover Hills Presbyterian Church at 1:00 p.m. on Sunday, December 11. The family asks that memorials be made to Westover Hills Presbyterian, Alzheimer's Arkansas or Odyssey Hospice.

Presentations were made on financial decision making, trends in mid councils, and following audit principles. General Assembly programs were presented and discussed, as were those of the Presbyterian Foundation and the Presbyterian Investment & Loan Program.

Time was spent hearing how presbyteries of different sizes were changing to meet new challenges. (There's that "change" word again!)

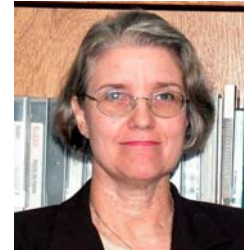

### LAST MINUTE ADVENT, CHRISTMAS AND EPIPHANY RESOURCES to use on December 18, 25 or January 1

- **"How Can I Celebrate Advent?"** (Acc. #DVD9498) combines live-action puppets, illustrations and 3-D computer animation for 27 minutes to explain the special season of waiting and preparation for the coming Savior. For very young children.
- **"A Thrill of Hope: The Christmas Story in Word and Art"** (Acc. #DVD9581 or 9590) contains a 50-minute DVD illustrated by the artwork of John August Swanson (A Visit, the Nativity, The Shepherds, Epiphany, Presentation in the Temple and Flight into Egypt) with commentary from faculty at Candler School of Theology plus a discussion guide. For adults or older youth.
- **"Veggie Tales: The Little Drummer Boy"** (Acc. #DVD9584) is a 45-minute animated DVD on the holiday classic song/story which asks "When it seems you have nothing to bring...What gift can you give the King?" For younger children.
- **"Veggie Tales It's a Meaningful Life: A Lesson in Being Content"** (Acc. #DVD9475) retells the story of the holiday classic movie It's a Wonderful Life when animated Stewart is given the chance to have the life he always thought he wanted as a big football hero. For children of all ages.
